2021 Colorado Springs USS Reeves DLG/CG 24 Reunion By Gerry Hines FTM2/VP USS Reeves Association

For the fifth time in the last 13 years, I have been selected (coerced) by our fear-less leader President Tom Bailey to write a diary of sorts about our recent very enjoyable reunion in Colorado Springs. To say it was a Rocky Mountain high would be an understatement. We had 58 attendees. I don't think a more scenic site for a reunion could be found anywhere. The President's Page

Greetings to the entire USS Reeves Association Family

I'm happy to announce that we just concluded our ninth USS Reeves Association reunion, and that it was easily one of the best reunions that the Association has ever seen. Now that we are rested up from the whirlwind of reunion activities, it's time to reflect on what was really behind the success.

Gerry's lead article on the reunion does a great job of explaining how the reunion went and what a great time we had. However, once the dust settled there are more than a few reasons why things worked out so well. It's important to consider the process while everything is still fresh, and to learn. So, here's my view of why this one worked.

For starters, the Colorado Spring location gave us a big advantage over past venues. Not that there was anything magic about the Springs, it was just that we live about 40 minutes south of the reunion site, and that alone enabled us to get almost all the supplies purchased ahead of time. We shopped locally for deals a few weeks ahead of the reunion and were able to store everything. It also saved us <u>a lot</u> in shipping costs. We just loaded everything into our enclosed trailer for our trip to the Springs.

We arrived on Wednesday afternoon but didn't have our hospitality suite until Thursday morning. We ran into some Reeves shipmates at the hotel that evening and got them signed-up for a working party the next morning to get the trailer off-loaded and the room set-up. That's when the Reeves magic started. The shipmates who had been volunteered for the next days working party grumbled a little, as expected, but they were all there the next morning and ready to go. We commandeered four luggage carts from the hotel and loaded each several times to have the trailer fully unloaded within 90 minutes. While the brute squad muscled full carts up to the third floor, there appeared yet more Reeves family to unload the boxes and get the entire room set-up for business. This was an all-hands evolution!

Mary noted that there was nothing but cooperation to get things done. No arguments.... just tell us what you need, and it was done. We had both hospitality rooms, the ships store, memorabilia tables, flags, table decorations, snacks, coffee bar, iced beverage coolers, and the adult beverage bar all set up by lunchtime. The level of cooperation was clearly that of a group of old friends that were there to work together to get the job done. We all smiled knowing that the Reeves Family was back together for the first time in three years.



Dodging Shot Lines By: Garland Davis as told by Kurt Stuvengen

While serving in USS Reeves CG-24 as a BT2, BTCS Vernon Bertelson arranged for me to be assigned as topside phone talker at the forward fueling station for underway refueling operations. This was my station until I made First Class and was then relegated to the pit.

During this period, we usually refueled from one of the Military Sealift Command tankers operating out of Subic Bay, Republic of the Philippines. The tankers Hassayampa, Passumpsic, Misspillion, and Ponchatoula were the Subic based oilers. The civilian crews of these ships were always practical and professional during refueling operations.

We were to refuel from the stateside based USS Kansas City a Navy crewed Oiler and stores ship. I am convinced to this day that I narrowly missed being injured or possibly killed by sailor from that ship.

When the receiving ship comes alongside a tanker or stores ship, the supply ship normally shoots a messenger line to the receiving ship. This line is used to pull ever greater lines over until the fueling rig can be connected. When the word was passed to "Stand by for shot lines fore and aft," I usually just crouched down behind the fueling sponson. The MSC ships shot well over the foc'sle and ASROC launcher.

After we came alongside Kansas City and the word was passed, I ducked behind the sponson and waited for the shot line to be fired. I peeked over the fuel line and suddenly realized that the fucking Gunner's Mate was aiming directly at me and fired as I raised my head. I quickly imitated a turtle and jerked my head behind the sponson as the shot line weight passed through the area where my head had been and slammed into the bulkhead. My quick reaction was the only thing that prevented the black mark on the bulkhead from ending up on my head.

To this day, I cannot wrap my head around the reason a sailor would deliberately try to injure a fellow sailor with a potentially deadly projectile fired from a rifle. Later, I was told that in the apparently less professional stateside fleet that the Gunner's Mates awarded each other points for hitting someone on the receiving ship with the shot line projectile.

After that incident, I always logged off and went to cover when the shot lines were flying regardless of what ship we were replenishing from.


